# Trauma Informed Awareness Day: Building a Healing-Centered Illinois May 25, 2022 Q&A

1. An entirely new kind of parenting education that reaches everyone, everywhere, all the time could be a powerful kind of trauma prevention. Should public health organizations be developing this new kind of parenting education?

Something to consider is what already exists and how to build on it. For example, Erikson Institute's Center for Children and Families was facilitating various workshop series prepandemic. Locally, The Kedzie Center has some amazing culturally and linguistically responsive resources for parents.

# 7. Don't we need permanent, continuous solutions (vs. more pilot programs)?

We need both. Unfortunately, many evidence-based programs are not tested or piloted in communities of color, and sometimes, the models do not provide the culturally sensitive response needed for the greatest impact. Also, impacted individuals and those with lived experiences who don't have research dollars behind them often have solutions that work. It is about pulling those programs up and resourcing them, building their capacity, and supporting them to be looked at as evidence informed. As a state, we would frame this type of work as a pilot.
